FACTS TO SUPPORT ABOVE CHARGE(S): I observed a 2003 white BMW with FL tag of GTRW77 travelling south on N. Monroe St. from Sharer Rd. I noticed that passenger headlight was out. I initiated a traffic stop based on this traffic infraction. I made contact with the driver/arrestee, who was the only occupant (and his name is also on the registration). The driver immediately appeared very nervous (hands were shaking as he obtained his ID from his wallet, chest was visibly rising up and down at a quick pace, and he spoke very fast and nervously).

When the arrestee pulled his DL out of his wallet, I noticed a Carrying Concealed Firearm permit in his wallet as well. I asked him if there was a gun in the vehicle. He stated yes and stated "It's right here" as he started to reach between his legs. I immediately gave him loud verbal commands to put his hands on the steering wheel, which he did. I asked him if he had any other guns on him or in the vehicle. He said no. I already had back-up with me and I had him step out of the vehicle and away from the gun. I had him step back to the rear of his vehicle, where I patted him down for anymore weapons. There were no more weapons on him that I could feel.

As I was waiting to obtain his DL when he was in the vehicle, I noticed a clear sandwich bag that was sitting in the center console, just above the gear shifter for the vehicle. Due to the gun and what he did, my attention was more towards him and the gun that was in the vehicle. Based on what I briefly saw and his nervous demeanor, I requested a canine unit en route to my stop. While running the arrestee's DL, registration, and criminal history, Ofc. B. Smith #581 arrived. Ofc. Smith deployed his canine partner and conducted an open air sniff of the arrestee's vehicle. Ofc. Smith advised us seconds later that his dog gave a positive alert to the presence of drugs. Based on the canine alert and that many times those involved with drugs carry guns for protection (we already knew there was at least one gun involved), we detained the arrestee in handcuffs. When we went hands on to handcuff him, he tensed up and would not listen to our commands to bring his hands behind his back. He was detained without further incident due to three of us quickly securing him.

Based on the positive canine alert, I searched the vehicle. I immediately noticed a bitter smell in the vehicle. I also noticed a white powder residue around the center console. When I opened the center console, I immediately noticed a sandwich bag that had a large amount of a white powder in it. In my training and experience, I believed that this substance was cocaine. There was also several other identical bags in the center console as well, three of them had various amounts of the same white powder. The bag that I first saw had 15.9 grams. The other three had the following weights in them: 7.7 grams, 1.8 grams, .4 grams, and then a total of 2.2 grams that was collected from the bottom of the center console. The combined weight was 28 grams, which is trafficking per Florida Statute. The white substances field tested presumptive positive for cocaine.

There was also another empty sandwich bag in the console that had white residue all over it. I also located a small digital scale in the center console that also had white residue on it, thus making the scale paraphernalia. The sandwich bag that I observed in the center console also had white residue. All of the sandwich bags were identical. In the center console there were several pieces of paper and documents that had the arrestee's name

on it. The cocaine and scale were sitting on top of everything. I searched the bag that was in between the arrestee's feet that he was reaching for that had the gun. Sitting on top of everything with the butt of the handgun pointing up was a Cobra Model FS 380, .380 caliber (s/n FS043736, 1 magazine with 7 rounds of ammunition in it). There were two more cell phones and a burner phone in this bag as well (many drug dealers will have multiple cell phones on them to carry out their business). There were several documents and prescription medicine with the arrestee's name on it as well in this bag that had the gun.

Once we located the cocaine in the vehicle, the arrestee was then searched. The arrestee had two more cell phones on him (for a total of five cell phones). In his front left pocket was a folded wad of cash with a rubber band around it. The denomination went from high to low (\$100's down to \$1's). The total amount was \$694. It is common for drug dealers to keep their money in a rubber band that gives them easy access to it. It is also common for drug dealers to keep their money from high to low denominations to make it easier to make change for their drug sales (commonly called a quick count). In the bag that contained the gun there was an opened box of Good Sense Sandwich bags. These were the identical types of bags that the cocaine and residue were in. I located another opened box of Good Sense Sandwich bags in the back seat behind the driver. Based on my training and experience, I know that people who sell controlled substances often have a bag with a large amount of controlled substance, a scale to weight the substance, and empty bags to put the substance in for sale.

The arrestee was Mirandized and refused to speak to us without an attorney. Since the arrestee was the registrant of the vehicle, only occupant, had drugs and drug paraphernalia in plain view of the driver (powder on center console, empty bag with residue in it in center console), and possessed a box of the same type of sandwich bags in his bag at his feet which he admitted was his, the arrestee was charged with the above listed charges. He was in clear control of the items (all within hands reach) and some of the items were in his vehicle within plain view. The cocaine, bags, opened boxes of bags, cash, and scale were all impounded as evidence. The gun was also seized due to the fact that drug dealers many times possess guns for protection. Based on the number of individual bags found with cocaine or residue in them, the scale, the new and unused sandwich bags, the firearm that was carried for protection, and the amount of cash and manner it was being carried, the arrestee was charged with possession of cocaine with intent to sell as well.

The vehicle was towed from the scene via rotation wrecker. The arrestee was issued a FL UTC for the headlight being out. I transported the arrestee to LCJ.
